

Year 2020 has been an unprecedented year with respect to the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to safety reasons, we were not able to engage with neither our annual Day of Dignity Event nor the Oaks Park Eid celebration events. Instead the focus was in providing the needed resources of sustaining the basic essentials, priorities on food, housing and working with partnering agencies for those in need at a time of pandemic crisis.

The Needy and COVID-19 Relief

Helping those in Need:

ISOS requires those receiving assistance to be an Oregonian/SW Washingtonian resident; sponsored by a service agency to validate the need and to provide a self sufficiency plan. Emphasis is to collaborate with other like agencies that provide resources/services that meet the needs of the client. The intent is to minimize duplication and to maximize collaboration.

Between 10-30 cases are served monthly.

ISOS is committed to prevent homelessness by providing rental assistance. This has been our top budget expenditure. Some of the other challenges for these families are loss of job, medical issues, insufficient disability funds and domestic violence.

Number of households served in 2020 was 81, spending \$217,814. This averages about \$2,689/household. Of those served, 35% are Muslims and 65% are non-Muslims. The decline of Muslims served is a reflection of the major decline of incoming refugees that are predominately Muslims.

COVID-19 Emergency Gift Cards: From April-December 2020, 29 agencies came to ISOS applying for gift cards for their clients in need. ISOS responded to their requests of need by spending \$39,839 for 1,466 people (747 adults; 719 children). ISOS will continue to provide the needed gift cards as long as the pandemic threat exists and the funds are available.

COVID-19 Basic Necessities Support: From March-December 2020, \$119,929 was spent on basic living essentials, i.e. rent support to prevent evictions, utilities, transportation, etc while working with sponsoring agencies on their ability to regain self-reliance and maintain their safety and well-being.

"Clients express so much gratitude in accessing grocery store gift cards with the freedom to get the things that they need and eat at home; whether that be culturally specific meals or diapers and hygiene products that their food stamps may not cover. The pandemic has made it so difficult for a lot of families to have access to food being unemployed, laid off, or working shorter hours. Food is such a basic necessity, yet has become so challenging to access. Food banks are available and open though have also experienced scarcity and don't always have all the ingredients needed to complete a meal."

"In the past calendar year I have referred four cases to ISOS for financial assistance related in one way or another to the COVID pandemic. Although their situations were very different the risk of losing their housing due to inability to pay rent (and/or back rent) once eviction moratorium is lifted was very real for them. I handled the following two cases:

One was a single African American Mom battling cancer who was unable to work during the pandemic due to neutropenia while receiving chemotherapy, ISOS provided her with rent assistance and money for food and utilities until she could be bridged to wait listed cancer programs.

One was a single African American woman who lost her job after contracting COVID from work exposure at a nursing facility. ISOS was able to pay her back rent and help her get some much needed furniture that improved her quality of life. She is about to launch her own catering business and told me that this was only possible because the financial assistance she received from ISOS relieved her anxiety and helped her to focus her energy on her business.

I cannot thank you and your staff enough for all that you do. I have worked directly with Kevin Leffler and Hena Zia (ISOS case managers) and they are both terrific. Providence is very fortunate to have such an amazing community partner here in Portland."

Partnerships

Sunshine Division:

ISOS collaborated with Sunshine Division in the distribution of food boxes (primarily produce and dairy products) to Oregon Islamic Chaplain Organization (OICO), Muslim Community Center of Oregon (MCCP) and Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization (IRCO) during the months of June, July and August totaling 1,070 food boxes to those in need of food in their communities.

• Jewish Family and Child Services (JFCS) Thanksgiving Drive:

In previous years, JFCS has provided some of ISOS families with complete Thanksgiving meal food boxes for a family of 5. Due to COVID-19 safety issues, JFCS provided instead of food boxes, Fred Meyers' \$75 gift cards to 10 ISOS families. The gift cards were mailed to the families with handmade Happy Thanksgiving cards by their youth. We thank JFCS for their thoughtfulness and care.

Oregon Food Bank:

ISOS collaborates with Oregon Food Bank to provide a mobile food pantry at Bilal Mosque once/twice a month to serve those in need of groceries, including fresh produce. For the 18 times food was distributed in 2020, 5,821 were served. They typically range between 65-75 families covering on average 485 people, 118 households per month. Languages spoken: Arabic, Somali, English, Nepali, Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, Indonesian, Urdu, Pushto, Turkish, Mandarin, Fula, Yoruba and Hausa (last 3 languages are African).



• Oregon Wildfire Relief Support:

Oregon faced disasters from the wildfires that have destroyed people's homes and lives. Over 40,000 need to rebuild their lives. The Governor is reaching out to all who can help our fellow Oregonian - our neighbor. Because of your donations, ISOS has sent \$5,000 to Oregon Governor's 2020 Community Rebuilding Fund, managed by Oregon Community Foundation. Many thanks!





Portland Police Muslim Advisory Council (MAC):

ISOS is a core member of the Portland Police Bureau (PPB) Muslim Advisory Committee (MAC), where Muslim community leaders along with the Portland Police meet monthly to review how to better work together to promote social justice to best serve the community with safety measures and maintain transparency of information. This is our 4th year in operation, which also has been the most challenging year Portland Police Bureau (PPB) has ever faced. Portlanders are requiring reform to make sure justice, safety, transparency and trust are being established. MAC is part of a coalition of advisory councils whose objective is to be a part of the reform review of policy, procedure and training of PPB.



• Ramadan Food Drive:

ISOS in partnership with Islamic Relief USA (IRUSA) distributed WinCo food cards worth more than \$30,000. Distribution of WinCo cards made it possible for 609 families, with a total of 1946 individuals, to get food on their table during this blessed month.

We are very appreciative of the support provided by Islamic Relief USA and also to the following agencies that provided the distribution of the food cards, with safe practices: Portland Refugee Support Group (PRSG), Muslim Community Center of Portland (MCCP), African Youth Community Organization (AYCO) and Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization (IRCO) who covered Middle East, Rohingya, Burmese and African clients.
